

Sustainable Crop Rotations with Brassica Cover Crops

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Type of Cover Crops

Legumes: Make Nitrogen, low C:N ratio cowpeas, Austrian winter pea, hairy vetch, red clover, soybeans

Grasses: Accumulate nutrients (fine roots), C:N ratio depends on killing date: oats, cereal rye, annual ryegrass, barley, wheat, Sorghum-Sudan.

Brassicas: Good for surface compaction and weed control: Daikon radish, turnips, kale, rape

Brassicas

- Fast growing, high in moisture, freeze out and die at 15^o Fahrenheit.
- Absorb 5-5.3% N if nitrogen is available.
- Release natural fumigants and natural weed suppressant chemicals as they decompose.
- Smell like propane, gas leak, or dirty diaper when they decompose at temperatures above 50⁰ F.





Cover Crop Radishes

Disadvantages

- Should not be sown too early in the summer – potential reseeding
- May not be sown too late (need at least 6-7 weeks growth for best results)
- Hard seed will come up in spring
- Smell at spring thaw

Advantages

- Potentially deep
 penetrating large tuber
- Enhances soil percolation
- Usually reduces soil compaction
- Earthworm "Heaven"
- Voracious scavenger of nutrients
- Good for Grazing

Railroad vital to **NW Ohio** economy Grant would

It can be annoying to get stuck at a railroad crossing, especially if you're in a hurry, but these trains play a vital role in supporting area industry.

In 2007, more than 311 million tons and nearly seven million units of freight were transported on Ohio railroads with coal, inon, steel and grain topping the list of freight originating from the state.

"They're absolutely critical for northwest Ohio's economy," said lerry Hayes, executive director of comonic development of Dellance County. "We have a group of busi-nesses in fairly heavy industry that rely on rail in this area."

"It is a highly important service to the devators and farmers in our area," said Hayes. He added that locally the Jeweil Grain Co. and Gerald Grain Center are two business that rely heavily on rail to ship grain. According to Tony Langham,

A purgent odor in the vicinity of a pair of natural gas tacilities located north of Defiance isn't caused by a gas leak.

The odor, which has led the Tiffin Township Volunteer Fire Department to respond to five odor Investigations in the last 45 days, is caused by a cover crop planted along Ohio 66, north of Banner School Road.

The cop of oilsed radishes is located near the


large TransCanada natural gas compression station and the smaller Panhandle Eastern exchange station. Citizens have apparently smelled the decaying rad-ish plants — planted to help retain nutrients in the soil - and have called authorities to report a suspected gas leak. The latest call came into the Deflance County Sherilf's Office 911 center on Tuesday.

"It's manpower. Each time we go out there it's about an hour," said Tiffin Township Fire Chief Jamie · ODOR, Page A10







Daikon radish







Fall soil nitrate after manure application





Phosphorus	0.97	23
Potassium	3.27	230
Sulfur	0.81	60
Calcium	2.17	150
Magnesium	0.26	20

Seed Cost Matters

 There are "no good deals" on "Cheap" Seed...

- Especially not on ARG, Radishes, Turnips, Hairy Vetch, etc...
- VNS (often times) ≠ Very Nice Seed!

Other Brassicas

- Kale: Drilled 3-5#/A 0.25 to 0.75 inches Broadcast 4-6#/A
- Rape or Canola (Dwarf Essex)
 Drilled 3-5#/A 0.25 to 0.75 inches
 Broadcast 4-6#/A



Rape/Kale

Rape Seed or Dwarf Essex Drilled 2-5 #/A Broadcast 3-6#/A

Fibrous root system 15-25% CP for Forage Good Forage Needs to be planted earlier than Kale Kale Seed Drilled 3-5#/A Broadcast 4-6#/A

Cold tolerant Reaches 25 inches tall Grazed until December-January Good for wildlife

SUMMARY

- Brassicas (radish, kale, rape) grow quickly and recycle nutrients & reduce compaction.
- Only buy the Daikon radish and do not buy VNS (Variety Not Specified) radish.
- Radish will die in the winter and may smell bad when they decompose. Kale and rape should survive the winter.
- Cover crops need 60-90 days of fall growth to survive winter. Plant early maturing crops or plant early to maximize cover crop growth.



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
